Hamilton Watch Cagers Take 1st Championship Of Industrial League

After an absence of two years, Hamilton Watch entered a team in the 1965 Lancaster Industrial Basketball League and walked off with top honors.

The Hamilton cagers promptly ran off a streak of 18 consecutive victories to finish the season undefeated in regular league play. This marks the first time that Hamilton has won an Industrial League championship.

In the post-season playoffs Hamilton ran into a fine RCA team and an abundance of foul trouble and dropped two decisions by scores of 78 to 75 and 88 to 83. These were two of the most exciting games of the year. However, in league play the Hamilton squad squeezed by RCA by 81 to 74, and in the most important game of the season they drubbed RCA by a count of 96 to 67.

The team was comprised of a talented and speedy crew who featured a "run and shoot" type of offense and a tight man-to-man defense. And if the teamwork was less than desired, you can't argue with success. Hamilton averaged 94.0 points per game in the regular season compared to a 50.0 point average for the opposition.

The Industrial League All-Stars played Hamilton Watch in the final game of the season. With their pride stung after losing the play-offs, the boys really put on a show to wreck the All-Stars by a 111-86 tally. This game featured a tremendous performance by Mel Reed (machine shop) who stuffed in 41 points.

Besides Reed (16.7 avg.) who starred at Hempfield High, the stalwarts of the team included Harry Geraci (14.0) and Clyde Brown (10.6), both standout players at McCaskey High School, Tom Stoudt (11.7) former All-County soccer player turned basketeer, Mike Hermann (13.9), former co-captain at Dickinson College and winner of the Athlete of the Year Award in his senior year. Rounding out the nucleus was Dick Censits

A special rail trip through the picturesque Susquehanna Valley will be sponsored on Sunday, April 25, by the H.R.A. and the Lancaster Chapter National Railway Historical Society. Features of the trip include a tour of the Wilmington car shops, and

a camera stop at Conowingo.

More than 60 H.R.A. members and guests will fill a special Hamilton car, which leaves Lancaster at 9:30 a.m. After passing through Columbia, the train runs along the east bank of the Susquehanna to Harrisburg. There, it will cross the river, recross at Marietta, return to Columbia, then run south past Safe Harbor, Holtwood and Conowingo Dams. In Maryland, the train will pass Port Deposit and Perryville, cross the state line into Delaware, where passengers will be taken on a tour of the Wilmington car shops. The train will return via Philadelphia, arriving in Lancaster at 5:50 p.m.

On parts of the 237-mile tour, the train will use freight lines that have not been used by a passenger train in some 10 years. During one leg of the trip, a tricky engine maneuver is required because part of the track is not electrified.

Photography fans will have the use of protected open doors in the baggage cars to record the day's adventure on film. The Pennsylvania Railroad will sell coach lunches and beverages, or the rail buffs may bring their own picnic lunch.

Tickets are \$8.25 for H.R.A. members and immediate family, \$5.00 for children ages 5 to 11. Reservations may be made in the personnel office through April 23.


