Teachers Tour Hamilton For BIE

The teachers came to school at Hamilton on October 28 when the company cooperated in the 16th annual Business-Industry-Education (B.I.E.) Day in Lancaster.

The objective of B.I.E. Day is to acquaint the business and educational communi-

ties with each other's goals and operations through an exchange of visits. This year it was industry's turn to play host to the educators.

A total of 28 teachers from the Columbia, Donegal Union and Warwick Union School Districts arrived at Hamilton early in the morning for a getacquainted session in the Board of Directors room. A comprehensive tour was next and included the watch manufacturing area, precision metals division and the military products White Room. As with many visitors to the Hamilton Watch Company, the teachers marvelled at the patience and temperament characteristics required of Hamilton's factory employees.

After a luncheon in the cafeteria, the educators returned to the Board of Directors room where Richard J. Censits, assistant controller, Robert V. Hartman, director of merchandising, and John Reber, manager of manufacturing and engineering, conducted a session on the functions of the finance, manufacturing and marketing divisions of the company. Strong emphasis was placed on the free enterprise system to give the teachers a close look at how the United States economy is related to operations at Hamilton.

An address by President Arthur B. Sinkler concluded the day's activities.

Although it had been only necessary to time all previous watches in two positions before Accutron became the winner, it was necessary to run the Hamilton electric through four positions, with an aggregate position error of 0 while the Accutron aggregate position error was ± 5 seconds.


It was later announced that the Hamilton electric was the only winner and Ed picked up Gift Certificate #1.

UNITED FUND INCREASES

A HAMILTON IS FOREVER

Hamilton watches are now guaranteed forever in writing, according to a policy recently publicized to employees and Hamilton dealers throughout the world.

A recent memorandum from Vice President of Manufacturing Frank A. Christoffel has called to the attention of watch manufacturing, assembly, and service personnel an important recent revision in the wording of Hamilton's watch guarantee.

Hamilton watches have traditionally carried a "Lifetime Guarantee." However, this year it was revealed at the January sales conference that the guarantee would apply to all original defects in material and workmanship "Not for five or ten years. Not even for just a lifetime. IT IS FOREVER."

Replicas of the guarantee are posted throughout the factory. "We do this," Mr. Christoffel stated "as a constant reminder of the pride we have in our product and our employees—and the responsibilities it implies."

The "forever" guarantee actually existed previously in practice, explains Director of Merchandising Robert V. Hartman, "Hamilton's policy has always been to correct, free of charge, any original defects in material or workmanship discovered in their products, regardless of age. We are now merely capitaliz-
