Michael L. Bateman

It is with deep regret that we announce the death, on July 4, of Michael Laurence Bateman, chairman of the Hamilton Watch Company, Ltd. of London, England. Mr. Bateman had served as chairman of Hamilton's British subsidiary company since its founding in 1962.

His affiliation with Hamilton capped a distinguished life-long career in British horology.

Prior to World War II he was manager of Crusader Timepieces, Ltd. and devoted much of his leisure time to horological interests. During the war he harnessed the technical skills of Crusader watches to instrument production. In addition, he was occupied by the Inter-Services Research Bureau where he was concerned with the invention, development and production of delay mechanisms.

In 1945, Mr Bateman, who had always been one of the band of people devoted to encouraging the revival of British watch production, joined Ingersoll, Ltd. He played an important part in the post war growth of the firm becoming managing director in 1947 and chairman in 1958. He retired from Ingersoll at the age of 70 only to start a new career and a new business with the Hamilton Watch Company.

Mr. Bateman joined the British Horological Institute in 1945, and soon was on its council, serving for four years as its chairman. About the same time he was admitted to the Worshipful Company of Clockmakers of which he later became the Master. Mr. Bateman also took a leading part in establishing London's newest company of Scientific Instrument Makers and was appointed to its Court last year.

Mr. Bateman leaves a widow and son, Geoffrey.
