WALLACE POWER PLANT EXPANDED TO MEET GROWTH

Behind any expansion and growth program is the assumption that a sufficient supply of steam will be available to heat the buildings, generate electric power and operate the machinery. In order to meet the demands of growth, a major expansion of the Wallace Power Plant was begun in 1969.

The heart of the power plant expansion is a new boiler which is capable of producing 50,000 pounds of steam per
