NEW MARKETING CONCEPTS ADOPTED BY WATCH DIVISION

An enthusiastic group of 31 Hamilton-Vantage salesmen winged home from their annual Sales Conference in Lancaster, January 5-8, primed with a potent lineup of new plans and programs for watch selling this Spring. The lineup was characterized by Vice President Richard Stork as "a new Hamilton, with new directions and new horizons." These new programs include:

New Distribution Policy — Hamilton will distribute its products only through the finest jewelry and department stores across the country and fair-trade pricing will be fully supported.

The Product Manager Concept — The product line has been reduced into segments so that each can be managed on a professional, de-centralized basis. Headed by General Marketing Manager, Eugene Angers, and General Product Manager, Charles Stiefvater, the Product Manager group will include: Steve Bomer, Hamilton Watches; Ed Jones, Vantage, Emblematic and Buren Watches; Frank Chiappetta, Sportsmen's and Designer Watches; Bill Vogt, Hamilton and Vantage Clocks.

New Sample Kits — A new zippered case containing two luxurious small cases was presented by Sales Director, Joe Strauss. One case contains trays of higher priced models; the other, an attache case, houses a leather-bound album showing all 404 Hamilton and Vantage watches in full

In-House Design Center — Staffed by Jean Wuischpard, Ken Derr, and Joe Long, the center will be the focal point for the design of cases and dials.

New Advertising Co-op Program — There will be a return to the former practice of sharing advertising costs with dealers.

New, Standardized Trade Show Display – A colorful booth is being prepared for corporate participation in trade shows.

Xerox Training Program - The program was presented by Jim Robinson of

Xerox as a "Thinking Man's Plan" to retrain everyone, from industrial manager to salesman.

Commenting on the new directions Hamilton is taking, Vice President Stork emphasized that we are now entering the "Sober Seventies" — sober representing a "rational, well-balanced, dispassionate approach within the watch group in viewing where we've been, who and where we are presently, and where we are going." He envisioned the decade ahead as embodying Hamilton leadership in time technology, salesmanship, better company relations with dealers, leadership in the marketplace, group responsibility and group evaluation.

HAMILTON AWARDED CONTRACT FOR MILITARY RADIOS

Launching the first step in a major swing to make a wide range of new products, the systems division of Hamilton Watch Company has been awarded a \$6,097,000 contract by the Army Electronics Command to manufacture military radios.

The contract calls for the production of 12,247 sets of one type and 1,485 of another type over a 2½ year period. Weighing 37 pounds and measuring 12 by 12 by 4 inches, the military radio was designed by RCA and will have 96 channels operating on 16 selected crystals.

James Guerin, general manager of the systems division, announced that 200 employees will begin production of the radios in approximately 90 days; and, a

58,000 square foot building at 1245 Manheim Pike, formerly occupied by Glenco Industries, has been leased as a manufacturing and assembly complex for the radios. It is expected that employment will reach 500 to 600 at the new facility within a two-year period as production lines will be set up for other products manufactured by the group.

According to Donald G. Cooper, vice president of the metals and instruments group, "Our precision metals division will be growing at a rapid rate in 1970 and needs additional manufacturing space at our main plant. And the systems division, which is broadening its technical and manufacturing capabilities, needs additional facilities for its high volume semi-automated assembly lines."
